2. Commodore's Commentary for February

Of the many yacht club issues that nobody ever thinks about, our lease with the City of Brisbane is close to the top of the list. We have ground lease for an area slightly larger than our building; we built and paid for the building. In January the Board approved an amendment to the lease that extends its term to 2048. This assures that the club will be here for a long time.

Last year, 2017, was a strong year for membership growth which tells us the Club is doing something right. We had, and so far this year continue, to have new incoming members and fewer resignations than in the past. We benefit from having a clean, well operated marina for our membership base. The bar remodel project is underway, if somewhat invisibly: the committee running the project has begun to order materials! Much of the work will be done off-site with pre-assembly beginning late this month. There will be no monthly dinner in March and once the existing bar is demolished we will have a temporary bar with beer and wine available but no hard liquor.

We have had an upsurge recently in members using the club address for mail or package delivery. The Club's policy is that we are not your address and we take no responsibility for forwarding members' mail or providing security for packages. There are plenty of places, including the Brisbane post office that can provide these services.

Last fall the Board approved a policy stating that during a calendared, club-sponsored event members may not have separate events within the club or use kitchen and cooking facilities. We request your cooperation with this policy to assure that club-sponsored events are successful.

Finally, in the boring day to day category, we are enjoying improved kitchen housekeeping. If you are going to use the kitchen please put away clean dishes that are there when you start and clean your pans and dishes before you leave. This makes it work better for everybody. 9. A Sailing Trip in the Spanish Virgin Islands


I've just returned to the bitter cold of my home in AK from the beautiful islands off the east coast of Puerto Rico, known as the Spanish Virgin Islands. My wife and I chartered a Jeanneau 409 Odyssea out of Fajardo, PR with 3 friends and sampled the coves, harbors, and beaches of Culebra, Vieques, and Culebrita islands. Yes, they had a major hurricane season, and Yes, there is visible carnage from the storms. But! don't be like our TV news stations and focus on the damage, look to the people and the major steps they've already made in recovery. Everyone we met was cheerful, helpful, and beamed with resilience. This ain't their first big storm. The marinas are fully functional with fuel, water, restaurants and bars. There are fully stocked grocery stores nearby. Even the hard hit islands have electricity in the small towns now, and the grocery stores will keep you stocked.

We sailed for 10 days with only one day of large (8') swells and winds over 20. All the rest were incredibly consistent days with 14kt trades out of the east and 2-4' seas at most. Mooring balls are very available as there are very few cruisers right now. Sandy bottom areas between reefs make occasional anchoring easy and secure. Some reefs show signs of storm damage and others looked untouched. Many of the beaches have already been cleaned, while a few have occasional piles of detritus from trees and sea. Sea life is plentiful with fish, turtles, rays, and LARGE sharks (ok, i only saw one, but it was a 10' Lemon shark and I'm never leaving the boat again...).


The only downside I would like to share is a caution to future renters... The storms definitely leave some, mostly cosmetic, dock rash on the boats. And, in our case, a few minor maintenance items that had been overlooked in the rush to get things operating down there. So take a long, slow video of the outside and inside of your boat before you leave the dock. Talk to the video about what anomalies you see as you go. Then use a checklist MORE thorough than the company's version to itemize and document any non-present or non-working parts. When they see you being thorough, they gain confidence in you as someone that cares about the vessel.


There have been lots of cancellations down there since the hurricanes and there are some awesome deals to be had! Get to it before the crowds return- if there ever was a crowd.
