## 6. Beer Can Racing Update

#### Beer Can Racing - your summertime Tuesday night break

Only about five weeks until racing starts on May 7th. The documents including the registration form are posted on the website so you can get registered right away.

Introduction to Racing presentation: We will have this on Sunday April 28th to acquaint new participants in our races with the rules and how we operate. If you have wondered in the past how it all works this is your chance to find out. You don't need to have a shiny new boat or a professional crew – we're in it for fun and learning to sail our boats better. Check the club calendar for the exact time.

Most Improved: This season our Most Improved Award will be a one free monthly dinner at the Club for one person! We hope this will provide a little more incentive for racers to keep on improving their performance and finish times. Sailing Instructions describe how these will be awarded.

Meals: No change in after-race meal pricing this year. Still \$9.00 for dinner and we will again be offering a 10% discount card as we did last year.

Volunteers: Yes, we need volunteers! It takes about ten people to run the races, prepare the food, and serve the drinks. Every week. For 17 weeks. That's a lot of volunteer hours. Our greatest needs are cooking (contact me or Renee Olson) and bar tending (contact me or Melissa Vivas). We also need additional help on the committee boat and at the finish line from time to time (contact me). These are great opportunities to be involved with a very enjoyable club event.

Rules: This year we have added one new rule to help with light wind problems we have sometimes at the end of the races. When the winds at the finish are very light and there is a tidal current running boats can be moved by the current alone. When they do not have <a href="steerage">steerage</a> they are essentially out of control and we have had close calls of boats nearly colliding with the concrete channel markers that are the finish line marks. The Racing Rules of Sailing permit the use of engine or other means of propulsion under precise, stated circumstances so we have added the following rule to avoid damage to boats:

- 1.5 Pursuant to RRS Rule 42.3(i) a boat's use of propulsion by engine or any other method while *racing* is permitted only as follows:
- 1.5.1 When in immediate danger of striking a fixed or rigid *mark* or other *obstruction* due to conditions of calm or very light wind <u>and</u> tidal current.
- A boat using propulsion in these conditions shall notify the race committee as soon as possible of the duration of its use, the circumstances, and what actions were taken to insure the boat did not gain an advantage in the race. The race committee shall review each instance of propulsion use for compliance with this rule.
- 1.5.2 After a boat *finishes*.
- 1.5.1 allows a boat to use their engine to stay clear of the mark, but only when the danger is immediate that is, when the boat is very close, like within the *zone*. It also requires the boat to report that they did so in order that the race Committee can verify they acted within this rule.
- 1.5.2 allows a boat to engage their engine as soon as they finish, which is when any part of their boat crosses the line. If in doubt, check with the finish line committee on your VHF radio. This change will allow boats to get quickly out of the way of other boats in light wind conditions.

If you have questions about this rule contact me and we can talk about it.

Note – words in *italics* in the rule are words with definitions in the RRS.

# 8. Haven's Two Yearly Haulout

My good ship Haven is currently hauled at the San Francisco Boat Works for her two yearly maintenance and spruce-up. This year I decided I must replace the 40 year old through hull fittings and seacocks; my old seacocks were of the old conical types that you periodically needed to take apart and grease (when the boat is out of the water of course). The five major seacocks and throughull fittings were replaced along



with the addition of new backing plates (the old seacocks were fitted with just

the flanges as backing - naughty). The two modern bronze valves - raw water intake and head intake- were examined for wear and corrosion (all good) and cleaned up and re-fitted.

The prop was cleaned and re-edged and treated with Prop Shield. Prop Shield is amazing stuff, it protected my prop from weed and crustation buildup from the last two years of Bay use - when the boat was hauled, the prop was clean and still had original Prop shield compound protection evident. The gutless bearing was also examined for wear, all good as it and the shaft, stuffing box and fittings replaced 4 years ago. Over the years whenever

Haven was hauled, I had major and some minor blisters repaired. On. This haul, all looked good and so no new blisters that needed attention were found. The below water line and above water line blemishes were fixed, two coats of anti fowling





applied, and the upper hull was cleaned and polished using a special gelcoat coating. This week, before

launching this coming Monday, I am taking the teak topsides back to natural wood in preparation for a new teak coating of which I have not yet decided which one to use. I am tending towards Honey Teak, which has very good lasting properties but is very expensive. Maybe it is right in what they say that 'a boat is a hole that you pour money into'. But, my boat is like a family, she has supported me through good and bad times and has been a great companion and getaway, so I happy to spend on some Loving for the old gal.
